# AGS Requirements

To graduate from George Fox University with an Associate of General Science degree, students must complete a minimum of 60 semester credit hours based on the requirements listed below, have a cumulative grade point average of 2.0, and complete an AGS interest form at the beginning of their senior year.

## Communication (3 credit hours\*)

- Must complete one communication course

## Humanities & Fine Arts (15 credit hours\*)

- Must complete LACC 221: US History (GFD online junior or senior year)
- LITR 270 Great British Writers
- Must complete a writing course\*\*
- Must complete THEO 101 or THEO 102
- LACC 220 Great American Writers

## Social Sciences (9-12 credit hours\*)

- Must complete PSCI 190 American Government
- Complete 6-9 additional credit hours (2-3 courses)

## Mathematics (3 credit hours)

- Must complete one course (3-4 credit hours)

## Science (6-9 credit hours\*)

- Must complete 2-3 courses

## Capstone

- Must complete AGS capstone course

## Electives (17-21 semester credit hours)

- A minimum of 60 semester credit hours is required; any remaining semester credit hours must be fulfilled through elective coursework.

# AGS Process Checklist

## Steps for AGS Diploma Completion

### 1. Course Planning Meeting:

Students/Parents must meet with a high school counselor to complete the AGS/Horizon Course Plan Worksheet.

### 2. Attend an Information Session (Optional):

Students and/or parents should participate in an AGS program information session.

### 3. Course Enrollment:

Students are required to enroll in the courses listed on the approved course plan worksheet during their sophomore, junior, and senior year.

### 4. Verification (Senior Year):

At the beginning of the senior year, students on track to complete a minimum of 60 credit hours will submit an AGS interest form.

### 5. Graduation Application:

George Fox will send an AGS graduation application and relevant graduation information to all qualified students.

### 6. Diploma Awarded:

The AGS diploma and cord will be granted at high school graduation.

## Dual Credit Course Offerings

### **ARTS 101 2D Principles & Elements (3 credit hours)**

An introduction to materials, techniques and theory related to two-dimensional design.

### **ARTS 102 3D Mixed Media (3 credit hours)**

This course focuses on three-dimensional design. Hands-on projects are the primary learning mode. Additional course fee is required.

### **ARTS 111 Drawing I (3 credit hours)**

Art majors given preference. This course is a study of materials, methods, and techniques used for drawing with pencil, ink, charcoal, and other drawing media.

### **ARTS 217 Art Survey History From 1450 (3 credit hours)**

A survey of the elements and concepts of art theory and practice as reflected in culturally and historically significant painting, sculpture, architecture, and other art forms, from 1450 to the present.

### **CHEM 120 Foundations of Chemistry (4 credit hours)**

This course will cover introductory concepts of chemistry. Special attention is given to topics of current interest, such as environmental chemistry, alternative energy, or biochemistry. This course meets general education requirements and is designed for non-science majors. Three lectures and one laboratory period per week.

### **ECON 200 Principles of Economics (3 credit hours)**

This course is an introduction to the fundamental principles of economics, and their application at the micro and macro level. In the microeconomic portion of the course the behavior of individuals, households and firms will be explored. The macroeconomic portion of the course will focus on economy-wide conditions, such as gross domestic product, unemployment and recessions. Throughout the course the ways in which the economy contributes to, and deters from, human flourishing and well-being will be considered, discussed and debated.

### **LITR 220 Great American Writers (3 credit hours)**

A brief survey of American literary history, combined with a close study of some of the most engaging works and writers in the tradition.

### **LITR 270 Great British Writers (3 credit hours)**

An introduction to British literary history, combined with a close study of some of the most engaging works and writers in the tradition.

**MATH 190 Precalculus (4 credit hours)**

A course for students who are preparing to take calculus or other courses requiring a similar background. In addition to studying the topics found in a college algebra course, this course will focus on trigonometry and an introduction to exponential and logarithmic functions. Prerequisite: high school algebra or its equivalent. Students who have taken MATH 180 College Algebra may not take this course for credit.

**MATH 201 Calculus I (4 credit hours)**

The class is a study of limits, limits of functions, applications of derivatives, and an introduction to integration. Prerequisite: MATH 190 Precalculus Mathematics or equivalent.

**MATH 240 Statistical Procedures (3 credit hours)**

An introduction to probability and statistics with content and application directed toward the natural and physical sciences. Topics to be covered include methods of describing data, probability, random variables and their distributions, estimation, hypothesis testing, linear regression, and correlation. Prerequisite: MATH 180 College Algebra or equivalent.

**MKTG 260 Principles of Marketing (3 credit hours)**

Study of the marketing concept, consumer demand and behavior, and marketing functions of the firm. The objective is to understand the development of marketing channels, products, prices and promotion strategies.

**PSCI 190 American Government (3 credit hours)**

The theory and practice of the federal government and the study of key issues in government in general.

**SPAN 101 Introductory Spanish I (4 credit hours)**

In this integrated introductory study of the Spanish language, students will develop basic speaking, listening, reading and writing skills. Students will also be introduced to the cultures of the Hispanophone world. Spanish 101 will provide a firm basis for continuing the study of the Spanish language.

**SPAN 102 Introductory Spanish II (4 credit hours)**

An integrated introductory study of Spanish. Listening, speaking, reading, and writing are all integral to learning the language. Cultural aspects of Spain and Latin America are also presented as essential components. At the end of SPAN 102, students should have novice high proficiency as defined by the American Council of the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL).

**THEO 101 The Bible (3 credit hours)**

When reading the Bible, you may wonder how an ancient book connects to our lives today. This course will take the time to explore the various types of writings found in the Bible and explain how those old writings have a lot to say about contemporary society. This course will provide students with the opportunity to engage Scripture and see how it impacts their lives today.
